Message from the Interim Program Director




What would you be if you were not a physician?

UWMC and Harborview Faculty Team up to Create a New Medical Student Elective

We developed a two-week elective for 3rd medical students aimed at increasing exposure to and knowledge of the various inpatient non-MD specialty services. Students spent the mornings managing patients on the hospitalist service, and the afternoons working with physical and occupational therapy, respiratory, speech and swallow, wound care, pharmacy, vascular access, case management and spiritual care. We designed a quick-reference handbook to supplement the student's learning and the involved specialties managed to prioritize patient encounters to fulfill specific learning objectives. We plan to expand the enrollment period for 2018 and potentially expand to 4th year students in the future. Contact us with questions or suggestions.

Point of care simulation training and standardized technique to reduce the rate of complication in patients undergoing paracentesis at the University of Washington Medical Center:

Approximately 200 paracenteses are performed at UWMC annually, about half of which involve an IM trainee. Our analyses of these procedures suggest a higher rate of iatrogenic complications when the procedure is performed by IM residents, indicating an opportunity for improvement. Through development and implementation of a preprocedure checklist and standardized paracentesis technique we aim to improve patient outcomes. We have developed a simulation curriculum which includes bedside ultrasound and a high-fidelity paracentesis model delivered to interns on the first day of the UWMC wards rotation. We are now evaluating the effect of this training by gathering pre- and post-intervention survey data from trainees and by gathering and analyzing rates of complications to compare to our historical performance.
